## ABOUT US

The SAAAC Autism Centre began in 2008 as a response to the culture of shame, stigma and silence associated with ASD in the South Asian community in Toronto. In subsequent years, SAAAC expanded its scope and services to support all communities that experienced challenges accessing autism services and information due to language barriers, low incomes, cultural stigmas, and lack of support networks.

Today, SAAAC inspires families in need of access to ASD services, with a special focus on culturally and linguistically diverse families who often do not benefit from resource awareness or engagement. Our organization looks to create positive change through:

- Encouraging lifelong development of the children, youth, and adults we serve through diverse therapies and programs
- Empowering parents through education, training, and peer support networks
- Engaging racially and ethnically diverse communities through meaningful volunteer experiences and fostering greater understanding and acceptance of ASD
- Providing access for all through community engagement and knowledge sharing

Imagine this – you are brought up in a culture that does not have a discourse or infrastructure to support individuals and families living with developmental health challenges. These challenges are hidden and the realities of countless families are not even acknowledged. Can you see the hopelessness such situations can breed? It was this hopelessness we tried to overcome when we began the SAAAC Autism Centre. For over a decade, our mission has been to increase the dialogue, awareness, and support for newcomer families living with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD).

Our work began as a small grassroots organization supporting just a few families in 2008, offering dance programming and periodic workshops. Many of these activities took place out of the basement of my home with only close friends and families helping. Ten years later, we have grown to serve over 250 families with the support of 200 volunteers. In 2017, we built strong partnerships with Ontario's leading autism agencies; received funding support from all levels of government; and continued to develop our tradition of strong, innovative programming. In May 2018, with the help from the City of Toronto and Councillor Glenn De Baeremaeker, SAAAC will be moving into a new 11,000 square foot facility – a stark contrast from our early days in my basement.

None of these incredible achievements could have been possible with the support of our volunteers, sponsors, donors, parents, staff, and Board of Directors. With your commitment to reducing the stigma surrounding ASD, we have been able to provide innovative, evidence- based approaches to those in real need. SAAAC currently consists of 200 Volunteers, 12 Full-time staff, and 6 part-time staff, all working together to offer 11 types of programs focused on supporting the development of our students and their families.

I will never be able to fully articulate the gratitude I feel for all those who have helped SAAAC grow over the past 10 years. What our journey has taught me is that with hope, passion, and determination, nothing can stop us from making the kinds of changes that our society needs. Even when a situation seems hopeless, when we band together we are unstoppable. I cannot imagine what the next 10 years has in store, and I look forward to continuing to work with our partners and community members to continue to push through with innovative, evidence- based practices that will work to help the families we serve.

SAAAC's programming is geared towards helping our students and families reach their potential. The Centre provides 11 programs and services that support individuals with ASD across their lifespan: from developing vital communication and social skills for children in our ABA and Speech Therapy programs to providing employment training for young adults, SAAAC provides a full range of support services that foster skill development and encourage independence. ## Ontario will INVEST \$530,000 IN SAAAC over two years

In Oct 2017, Minister of Children and Youth Services Michael Coteau announced that Ontario will invest \$530,000 in SAAAC over two years in programs aimed at supporting parents of children and youth with ASD. The investment will support two programs:

- Assessment, Development, Empowerment (ADE) a program dedicated to arming parents and caregivers with information to navigate autism-related services, build a strong network of support, and learn basic behavioural and communication teaching strategies.
- SAAAC CARES Parental Mental Health Program a program to educate, empower and support caregivers who require post-diagnosis emotional support and counselling as they build their knowledge.

The investment was part of the province's new Ontario Autism Program (OAP), which began to be implemented in June 2017 and is transforming how children and youth with ASD and their families receive services and supports.

SAAAC is incredibly proud and committed to working with the province of Ontario to deliver quality services aimed at supporting the family as a whole. Our aim is to help parents and caregivers develop the skills they need to support their child or youth with ASD to help them thrive and reach their full potential.

## OUR JOURNEY

#### -SUPPORT FROM ALL THREE LEVELS OF GOVERMENT-

It all started when Glenn De Baeremaeker, a Toronto city councillor, knocked on the door of Erasiah Kobikrishna. Counillor De Baeremaeker was canvassing neighbourhoods when the two came across each other. Kobikrishna asked the councillor what he was doing for the autism charity located in his ward. Kobikrishna spoke of his 20 year-old son living with autism who was in need of extreme support and other families who were experiencing similar difficulties - all of whom were being supported by SAAAC. The encounter left a lasting impression on Councillor De Baeremaeker, who set off to work on helping families like Kobikrishna's.

During 2017, Councillor De Baeremaeker worked with city officials to help SAAAC move to a larger building near Scarborough Town Centre, one that's sat unoccupied for at least a decade. The larger space would allow the organization to serve more families and host a variety of programming.

Ultimately, Councillor De Baeremaeker was able to work with the City of Toronto to contribute \$940,000 to transform an abandoned 11,000 sq ft space into a functional state-of-the-art autism centre, which would serve nearly 400 families living with ASD annually.

"It's still a "scruffy, musty place" sitting "in the back end of nowhere," but renovations are about to start, and it will shine," said Councillor De Baeremaeker.

"We need champions like Glenn and other city councillors who made this all possible," says Kobikrishna. "Parents like myself need a community to support us in order to provide a good quality of life for children who need a lot of help. I am proud of Councillor De Baeremaeker for stepping up after our first encounter and being a passionate, committed advocate for his community." SAAAC's new home is slated to open in the early summer of 2018.



## OUR EMPOWERMENT

## -EMPLOYMENT AND LIFESKILLS PROGRAMS-

According to a 2013 Ontario study, Canadians with autism are under-employed: 13.9% work full-time, with an additional 6.1% working only part-time. With the help of Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC), SAAAC is looking to put a dent in those stats by helping 50 young adults with varying abilities to find meaningful employment in their communities.

## \$298,000 TO HELP 50 INDIVIDUALS FIND MEANINGFUL EMPLOYMENT

"What we want employers to know is that this isn't a scary or hard thing to do," says Geetha Moorthy, Executive Director of SAAAC. "Our students and many individuals with autism and other individuals of varying abilities are capable of doing good and meaningful work and can add value to any organization. With the right supports in place, we can help employers integrate these great individuals into their organization."

The program has attracted local community businesses like Saravanaa Bhavan Restaurant that has provided six part-time positions to SAAAC students. In addition, businesses like CustomEyes, Park Inn Hotel, JC Banquet Hall, NS Dental, Southern Aroma all have joined us as employment partners, providing employment opportunities to young adults with autism.



The clinic provided a part-time position to Joshua, a bright, humorous young man. "To us the program is not charity, but a meaningful way to incorporate individuals with autism into community life. Joshua is extremely kind and hard working, and we want to empower him and encourage him to lead a more independent life. We at CustomEyes are proud to be part of that journey."


